



Pinellas County Schools College Cohort

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Overview

Pinellas County Schools has partnered with The Foundation for Ensuring Access and Equity, a Marietta, Georgia community-based organization, since 2018. In 2020, our partnership with Guilford County Schools was the recipient of the [MAGNA Award](#) by the National School Boards Association for our expanding college access for first generation, lower income, and refugee students. Our foundation has used our partnerships with colleges and universities; published materials; essay writing guidance; and expansive knowledge of college admissions and financial aid policies to unlock amazing opportunities Pinellas County Schools students.

As a result of the personalized guidance, essay writing assistance, and interview preparation provided by the program, participating PCS students have received thousands of dollars in scholarships each year and over \$5 million in scholarships since the inception of the program. The Cohort is open to any PCS student, but students who most benefit from their involvement are students who are vested in their own futures and who genuinely desire to maximize their college and scholarship opportunities. The majority of the PCS students profiled on the following pages benefitted greatly by developing and pursuing a high school plan that positioned them as competitive college and scholarship applicants, and allowed them to avoid incurring thousands of dollars in student loan debt.



Ryan, Lakewood High School CAT Program

Tuskegee University

"My most significant Cohort experience was participating in the 5-day summer college planning boot camp with Faith Kumi (University of Chicago). The boot camp really showed me that there are ways to pay for college besides athletics, but it takes work. Mr. and Mrs. Wynn didn't sugarcoat the fact that it takes work to earn scholarships, but that boot camp helped guide my scholarship and school search. Initially I wasn't considering Tuskegee, or any HBCUs for that matter, until Mr. Wynn stepped on the scene with the CPC."

Ryan was offered a full scholarship to Tuskegee University as a Distinguished Presidential Scholar. While he was not a recruited athlete, as a varsity baseball player, he will be able to continue playing baseball, but his scholarship money will not be dependent on baseball.



Collin, St. Petersburg High School IB Program

University of Maryland

"Perhaps what has resonated most from my involvement in the cohort is that grades and test scores may open opportunities, but there is so much competition that so much more is required. Not only do I now fully appreciate the concept of developing a high quality 'body or work,' but I intend to take the lessons learned through my involvement in the cohort and one-on-one sessions with Mr. and Mrs. Wynn with me into college so that I position myself for additional scholarships, internships, and future opportunities."

Like Ryan, Collin had full scholarship opportunities at Xavier University of Louisiana and in the Claflin University Honors College. However, Collin chose to attend Lehigh University where he currently a Resident Assistant and has received free room and board.



Joanne, St. Petersburg High School IB Program

Johns Hopkins

As a ninth grader, Joanne joined the PCS Cohort on the urging of her younger sister, Jocelyne, who had participated in the middle school boot camp as a rising 6th grader. Throughout high school, Joanne's intentional efforts across the program's 3 pillars of scholarship, leadership, and service landed her a full scholarship to Johns Hopkins University and selection as a Jack Kent Cooke College Scholar.

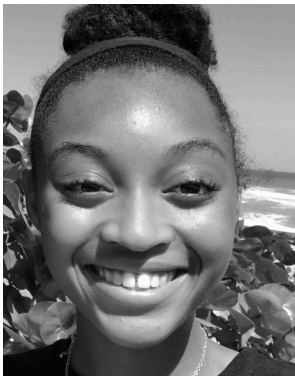


Sydney, St. Petersburg High School IB Program

University of Chicago

As a rising high school junior, Sydney was in our second PCS cohort of students. Sydney attended every monthly meeting and spent months developing the deeply personal essays presented here. Her lifelong top college choice was the University of Chicago, one of the most selective schools in the country. However, she was intentional in fully engaging in our program, building her résumé, pursuing leadership roles, and working to make a community impact. She put herself on the University of

Chicago’s campus through a summer immersion program during the summer between her junior and senior year of high school. As a result of her efforts, Sydney was one of only two students from the state of Florida to be offered admission via Early Decision to the University of Chicago Class of 2024, together with a full scholarship.

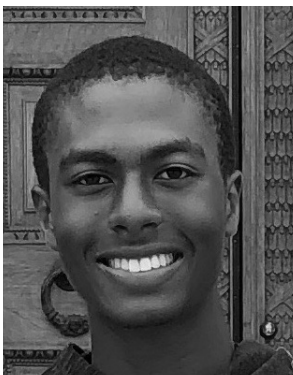


London, Lakewood High School Early College Program

FAMU

"I now have a deeper understanding of how to plan for college and the admission process. After attending the summer college planning boot camp as a rising high school sophomore, London continued participating in the program and received a full scholarship to FAMU where she is currently majoring in Physics.



Etame, Palm Harbor University High School

Swarthmore

Etame was in our first PCS summer boot camp as a rising high school senior. He landed several all-expenses paid fly-in invitations to such colleges as Amherst, Williams, and Swarthmore. We assisted Etame with his Early Decision application to Swarthmore, where he was offered a full need-based scholarship and has gone on to receive his BS in Computer Science



Parris, Boca Ciega High School

NC A&T Honors College

Parris, who lived with his aunt, joined the PCS Cohort as a rising high school senior with little time to identify full scholarship opportunities. However, through guidance provided through the program, Parris landed a full scholarship opportunity in the Claflin University Honors College. He was also offered admission to the North Carolina A&T Honors College where he interviewed for one of NC A&T Honors College Scholarships. While he was not awarded a full scholarship to NC A&T, he has enrolled at NC A&T and is currently majoring in Biology.



Hubert, St. Petersburg High School IB Program

University of Florida

"Participating in the boot camp experience was an amazing time. Many things had become more clear to me such as the importance of a resume, a strong body of work, and the characteristic of grit when it comes to the college application process. I have set various academic, community, and personal goals for myself for my upcoming years in high school. Some of them include becoming president of Key Club, the most influential service club on campus, getting an SAT score that would qualify me for national merit, and getting in contact with physics professors and physicists around the country to understand the career and education of an actualized physicist." By embracing the 3 pillars of scholarship, leadership, and service, Hubert's efforts were rewarded with his being offered admission to the University of Florida where he received the highest level of Bright Futures and is majoring in physics.



St. Petersburg College

Makayla and Kierra, Northeast High School

Sisters, Makayla and Kierra, provide the best examples that a college-bound plan does not have to lead directly into a 4-year institution. After attending the in-person sessions at Lakewood High School and engaging in comprehensive college admissions and financial aid research, they developed college-bound plans through the St. Petersburg College Transfer Agreement Program with plans of continuing their

studies at FAMU.



Caltech

Tuyen, St. Petersburg High School IB Program

"As an individual raised in a Vietnamese-speaking household, I had never been truly exposed to my options in higher education. Neither of my parents attended college and neither spoke English. I had no idea what it took to apply to college. Applying to college hadn't even crossed my mind. However, as I proceeded through my high school years until the start of my junior year, I noticed my classmates were equipped with resources and connections that I did not have. I knew that I wanted to pursue higher education but I didn't know how. That was what led me to attend the first meeting of my school's College Cohort Club, organized by Jocelyne Lioe, a current member of this program. College Cohort Club provided the resources that I was looking for, and so I sought to join

this program.

Joining this program and meeting Mr. and Mrs. Wynn has been the best decision I have made. Not only did they educate me about the college process, they helped me form an objective to work toward, guided me step-by-step in building my résumé, and developing leadership and community service profiles that would make me stand out in the college admissions process. Overall, they have tirelessly helped me along my college-bound journey. I still remember the night one of my application essays was due: it was late into the night, usually the time people like Mr. and Mrs. Wynn should be sleeping, and yet they were on the shared document of my essay, helping me revise it along the way. One thing that I can say about the College Planning Cohort program that makes it stand out from any other program is that Mr. and Mrs. Wynn are there for you even when you are not there for yourself. And they give brutally honest feedback that snaps you back to work--- speaking from personal experiences.

Through the guidance and support of Mr. and Mrs. Wynn, I applied to the QuestBridge Program as a College Prep Scholar and then as a College Match Scholar. I attended fly-in programs at Dartmouth, UPenn, and Caltech. Prior to joining this program, I knew nothing about these opportunities or what it meant to develop a "college-bound strategy." On December 18, all of my hard work and all of their guidance resulted in my being offered admission to Caltech, together with a full scholarship valued at over \$360,000 over 4 years. Wow, this is surreal!

- Selected as QuestBridge College Prep Scholars
- Offered full scholarships to such schools as Caltech, Claflin University, FAMU, Johns Hopkins University, Swarthmore, The University of Chicago, Tuskegee University, and Xavier University of Louisiana
- Selected as Jack Kent Cooke College Scholars
- Accepted to such fly-in programs as Amherst DIVOH, Caltech UpClose, Dartmouth Bound, Penn PEEPS, Swarthmore, and Williams WOW
- Summer experiences at such schools Carlton College, Johns Hopkins University, The University of Chicago, the University of Florida, Yale Young Global Scholars
